

 Having completed liberal arts curriculum, third-year students, based on their aptitude and preference, are placed in one of ten colleges with more than fifty departments throughout the University.







Curriculum Innovation

- Importance of "Learning Community"


Assignment of class

 Learning communities of about 40 students is formed based on their choice of a foreign language. Their "homeroom teacher" is assigned to them, and First-Year Orientation Camp is organized as a part of orientation programs every year. This language-based cohort serves as the primary learning community on campus.

Independent Study


- Started in 1949, Independent Study invites all the members of the U.T. to offer courses beyond their specialized discipline.

- Some of the courses are initiated by students.




First-Year Seminar


